EAC Unveils New Logo and Updated Gila Hank

Change was in the air as EAC faculty, staff, and students returned to campus for the Fall 2022 semester. Most noticeably, the College had adopted a new primary logo and updated their decades-old Gila Hank mascot. Despite the change, it was announced that the traditional Gila Hank mascot—designed in 1947 by The Arizona Republic cartoonist, Reg Manning—would remain visible in a retro, classic role. The College's traditional purple and gold colors would also remain.

Together the new logo and updated mascot are part of a new brand identity for the College that takes its primary design from more than 300 surveys and 15 comprehensive focus groups held with students, faculty, staff, and community members over the past year. It replaces the College's mountain

logo that was created in 1997 and refreshes the 75-year-old Gila Hank for use in digital platforms.

EAC's new primary logo features a bold shield reminiscent of the main architectural element used in past and current



campus structures. Inside that shield is a stylized "EA" monogram. For decades, faculty, students, and the local community have affectionately referred to Eastern Arizona College as "EA." The new logo was specifically designed to embrace that identity and create a brand that will more effectively resonate with both current students and alumni.

"We consistently heard that the College's primary logo should be bold and traditional yet retain a modern look and feel," said Todd Haynie, EAC president. "Our designer achieved this tall order by coupling the traditional shield with a stylized "EA" monogram – the letters most often used to vocally reference the College for the past 134 years."

The new identity system follows best design practices that extend the primary logo to various versions that brand

a growing institution – something EAC's mountain logo struggled to accomplish.

"EAC's brand is critical in today's competitive landscape. The new design seizes every opportunity to tell our story on every platform. It expresses why students should chose us over the others, communicates the quality of our services, and uses the boldest imagery to make us immediately recognizable. It is simply amazing."

For maximum brand recognition, the new brand identity also extends the College's primary logo to the EAC Athletic Department, including an refreshed version of Gila Hank. The new athletic design is the culmination of input that indicated change was needed, but that Gila Hank should

remain a strong, confident, and bold fighter.

Based on best design practices, this system includes the College's "EA" monogram as the primary athletic mark, the mascot mark for informal merchandising, the extended mascot mark for athletic programs, and full body versions

of the classic, new, and youth Gila Hanks.

"Eastern Arizona College has been known as the Gila Monsters for more than 100 years and Gila Hank has been a core element since 1947," Haynie added. "The updated version is committed to the central idea of Gila Hank over time, has the capacity to transcend change, and provides limitless marketing and public relations opportunities."

The design was developed with significant creative assistance from the College's current and former design students. **Monique Saldaña, '17** – a current EAC employee and former graphic design student – played a key role in the new visual identity. She made extensive revisions and exclusively created the Gila Hank youth mark.

Though he spent only one year at EAC, Dale LeMonds, '97 certainly made the most of it. He was a member of EAC's 1997 baseball team - the first to take the field since the program was discontinued in 1981. He also met and eventually married his wife of more than 20 years, Lisa Damron LeMonds, '97.

After leaving EAC,
Dale went on to receive a
master's degree in sports management
from Virginia Commonwealth University.
He also translated his experience
as a collegiate baseball player into a
coaching opportunity at the University of
Richmond.

In 2005, Dale and Lisa opened their first Aveda Institute location in Denver. Aveda Institutes provide education in the fields of cosmetology, esthiology/skin care, and massage therapy. In 2008, the LeMonds opened their second Aveda Institute location in Tucson, followed by a location in Provo in 2010, Phoenix in 2012, and Avondale in 2022. They also opened the LeMonds Spa and Salon at the Wigwam Resort in Litchfield Park, Arizona, in 2017.

Dale and Lisa have six children: Lucy, Chloe, Gavin, Jett, Maverick, and Bentley. Outside of work, Dale is a youth baseball coach for the Colorado Jets. Lisa is an accomplished hairdresser, but spends a majority of her time being a mom.

Upon her arrival at EAC in 2008, Eliza Wilson, '10 got straight to work on her Associate of Arts degree, studying sports medicine and athletic training. She spent several semesters as a work-study student in the athletic training facility

In 2011, Eliza was accepted into the athletic training program at Southern Utah University. There she completed her Bachelor of Science degree in athletic training. One month after her graduation in 2013, she passed her certification test and officially became a Certified Athletic Trainer (ATC). Eliza's first official position as an ATC found her back where it all began at Eastern Arizona College where she worked with the men's and women's basketball teams as an assistant athletic trainer, as well as providing additional coverage for the EAC football team.

Following her professional stint at EAC, she worked in a variety of different arenas that included secondary education, military, clinical, and collegiate settings. However, with the onset of the pandemic, Eliza was furloughed almost immediately. Recognizing this as an opportunity, Eliza decided to further her education. In May of 2020, she was accepted into the Doctorate in Athletic Training program at Indiana State University.

In the midst of completing her doctorate, Eliza was hired to be the athletic trainer for Safford High School in Safford, Arizona. She started this position during the fall of 2020 and remains there today.

to walk in graduation. Neither of them
realized the other was attending Indiana
State until a couple of months before the
graduation ceremony when they caught
up on social media. The graduation
ceremony was the first time Jonathan

days at EAC.

As the second youngest of a large blended family, he experienced a nomadic childhood—living in Ohio, Georgia, Minnesota, and California all before his 18th birthday. 

His first noted interest in this form of expression came when he saw the 2010 film Alice In Wonderland. It was the first time he remembers truly noticing all the subtle artistry and planning that goes into such minute details as a character's dress design, accessory design, and the message sent about character in something as simple as the practical boots Alice wore in that movie. He knew then, he wanted to be part of that world.

It was his experience at EAC that started opening doors for him in this field. For one year he took on a work study position with Timilee McNair. EAC's primary costume designer. He also took a few theatre classes at EAC to supplement his primary field of study in art. Along the way, he gained valuable mentors such as Stuart Gibson, Erika Johnston, Scott Dahl, Elizabeth Henley, and Patty Raines. In 2019, the EAC Theater Department invited McKay to accompany them to the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival in Los Angeles, where he won his first costume design award for the sketches he had created in Scott Dahl's Scenography class.

After EAC, McKay moved on to the University of Arizona where he earned a BFA in costume design. While there, he also began fostering his upcoming

professional career. Through his efforts at providing local costume design work in Tucson he was able to make good contacts and have amazing experiences working with the local theater community. 
