The Pursuit of Bachelor's Degrees

*Eastern Arizona College
pursues accreditation for
two bachelor's degrees*

The Graham County Community College District Governing Board has authorized Eastern Arizona College to pursue accreditation for a Bachelor Degree of Music in Music Education and a Bachelor Degree of Science in Health Sciences. Both degrees are anticipated to begin in August 2024 pending approval from the Higher Learning Commission.

Last year, Arizona Senate Bill 1453 passed allowing community colleges to offer four-year degrees. Eastern Arizona College was instrumental in moving this legislation forward.

"This decision follows the trajectory of EAC over the past 135 years because it strengthens our commitment to the ideals of access and affordability," said Todd Haynie, president of Eastern Arizona College. "These degrees meet students where they are and will prepare them for in-demand careers without the debt."

The Bachelor Degree of Music in Music Education will offer vocal and instrumental tracks that lead to a secondary education certificate. The Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences will prepare students for roles in healthcare administration, medical or pharmaceutical sales, and other health-related services. According to Dr. Susan Wood, EAC vice president of academic and student affairs, "these degrees will allow EAC to retain healthcare and music majors who are currently transferring to other institutions. They will also attract additional students from our community and the surrounding areas."

EAC's application for accreditation has included a formal review, a site visit, and an evaluation of all curricula, faculty, and facilities. EAC will then seek approval from the U.S. Department of Education to be eligible for financial aid. These action steps will allow both degrees to be recognized as accredited degrees and be eligible for transfer to a university for advanced studies. In parallel, EAC's Music Department is pursuing accreditation from the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). This will position EAC as the only Arizona community college to be accredited by NASM. ●

Serving Up Nostalgia

EAC's 1973 national championship volleyball team returns for 50-year anniversary

Eastern Arizona College volleyball legends returned to campus to celebrate their 50-year anniversary for winning the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) national volleyball championship in 1973.

Hall of Fame coach Gerry Hekekie and former players Yvonne Johnson, Colleen Merrill Lunt, Amelia Owens Holtsoi, and Janice Edington were honored at EAC's game against Pima Community College.

The 1973 EAC Volleyball Team, coached by Mayble Bodine and assisted by Gerry Hekekie, ended their season with 15 wins and two losses. Their win at the Arizona state tournament qualified them for a regional tournament in Durango, Colorado. After winning the regional tournament, the team played in the first AIAW national tournament held at Miami Dade Community College in Miami, Florida.

"If I remember correctly, we raised money and provided our own money to pay our way to the national tournament," said Yvonne Johnson. "There was no sight-seeing or extras for the trip. We slept four in a room in a motel that had lizards running around on the ceiling and floor. We did drive to the beach long enough for us to put our feet in, and all we saw of Miami was at night, as we drove to or from our motel."

To prepare for the national tournament, Coach Bodine enlisted Gerry Hekekie's help to teach the team power volleyball – the latest trend in the sport. Without Hekekie's help, the team would not have fared as well.

"Using what Coach Hekekie taught us, we ended up placing second in pool play on the first two days," said Johnson. "On the third day, we downed a tough Ricks College team from Rexburg, Idaho. What I remember about Ricks was that they had to play in little skirts, [which] would often hit the net when they jumped up, resulting in a loss of service or point for them. So, they started tucking them into their bloomers. Ricks College, with a change in uniforms, would win the national championship the next year."

Four years after the 1973 team's win, the AIAW merged with the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). The four national championship teams named prior to the merger include: Eastern Arizona College (1973-74), Ricks College (1974-75), Mesa Community College (1975-76), and Santa Ana College (1976-77).

"Over the years, EAC has continued to win titles, but we were always proud to know that we were the very first team to win the very first AIAW junior community college national tournament," said Johnson.

EAC's Gila Monster women's and men's soccer teams lead first-ever games held in the Gila Valley.

For the first time in the history of the Gila Valley, collegiate soccer takes to the field.

Women's Soccer Team

EAC Women's Soccer Team plays under the direction of Coach Charles Long, one of college soccer's premier coaches.

"I chose EAC because of Coach Long," said Kylee Holt, a freshman who plays midfield. "He sees the game really well and how it should flow."

Long comes to EAC from Snow College where he coached both men's and women's soccer programs. Long made school history when his men's team went to nationals in 2021. Under his direction, the men's team defeated Salt Lake Community College – the #1 ranked team in the nation – to win the Region 18 Title. For his efforts at Snow, Long was named the 2022 SWAC Women's Soccer Coach of the Year after leading his team to a 13-2-1 overall record during the season.

Long brings 30 years of coaching experience to EAC. He is fluent in Portuguese, English and Spanish, tools he uses to help international student-athletes adjust to life at EAC.

"Our team is from all over the world," said Holt. "Sometimes it's difficult to communicate with each other but Coach Long can explain everything very well so everyone knows their jobs."

Long's career also includes stops at the University of West Florida (1986-93), Mount Mary College (2002-04), and Western Texas College (2008-2012).

Men's Soccer Team

Coach Bobby Peters leads the EAC Gila Monster Men's Soccer Team.

Coach Peters comes to Eastern Arizona College after coaching women's soccer at Cochise College. Coach Peter's team won the Arizona Community College Athletic Conference in 2019, and he was named the ACCAC Coach of the Year.

Before his career at Cochise College, Coach Peters was the head coach for men's and women's soccer at Northwest College, assistant coach at Missouri Valley College, and head men's

soccer coach at East Central College. He holds multiple coaching awards for both men's and women's soccer, including the MCCAC and ACCAC Coach of the Year along with being named NAIA Regional Staff of the Year while assisting men's soccer at Missouri Valley College. ●

Clinton and Cami treasured their time at EAC and enjoyed all the social activities. After EAC, the Damrons moved to Flagstaff to complete their bachelor's degrees at Northern Arizona University, Clinton in zoology and Cami in secondary education.
