Don Caldwell leaves a lasting legacy at EAC

onald J. Caldwell grew up in southeastern Arizona and graduated from Catalina High School in Tucson. He moved to Thatcher to complete an associate of science at Eastern Arizona Junior College in 1963.

It was necessary for Don to work nearly full-time at the Safford Valley Cotton Growers Co-op while at Eastern. He became quite proficient at estimating bale weights while at the cotton gin.

He continued his education at University of Arizona where he also worked while studying agriculture.

After graduating from the U of A in 1966, he joined the US Army. He completed basic training and was assigned to be an instructor at Fort Belvoir in Virginia.

Following his time in the army, Don worked for several pharmaceutical companies. Don's career took him around the globe as he sold pharmaceuticals to businesses, governments, and other agencies in Southeast Asia, Central and South America, Europe, and across the United States.

Don planned to attend his 50-year reunion in 2003 for the Class of 1963 at Eastern Arizona College, but was unable as he was diagnosed with mesenteric cancer. His experience in the pharmaceutical world, and the assembling of a team of oncologists and other medical help, enabled him to prolong a 45-60 day life-expectancy into nearly eight years.

During that time, Don established a nursing scholarship at Eastern that has helped 14 students attend Eastern Arizona College, Arizona State University, and Brigham Young University. These students have shown

gratitude and gone on to be successful in their careers as a result of Don's generosity. His help went beyond financial as he shared instruction to help recipients learn about interviewing, writing resumés, and other career advice.

In his estate plans, Don arranged for a significant portion of his retirement savings and his home and property to be donated to create the Donald J. Caldwell Endowment. Earnings from his donation, valued at over \$1.5 million, will be used in perpetuity to help nursing students at Eastern learn the skills necessary to obtain strong employment. It was Don's purpose to help students receive employable

skills to provide for themselves and their families. He believed nursing to be an in-demand field. He was also proud to share that the Nursing Program at Eastern produces some of the best nurses in the country. Mr. Caldwell also enjoyed sharing with others that Eastern's tuition was a great bargain.

Don's life has been one of variety and challenges. Those of us who knew him know he wanted to make the world a better place. We are grateful for his efforts. He has definitely made a difference in the lives of nursing students at Eastern.

The Mary Louise "Mella" Palmer Memorial Scholarship was started in memory of Mary Louise Udall Palmer, '50. Known to her friends and family as "Mella," she passed away on March 10, 2010, in Thatcher, Arizona at the age of 78.

Mella enjoyed her years at EAC where she participated in the music program and built life-long friendships. She married Arden Palmer and they shared an eventful life together.

Mella was the daughter of former Supreme Court Chief Justice Jesse A. and Lela Lee Udall. She and her husband, Arden Palmer, were married for 57 years, living most of that time in Thatcher.

The couple lived in Carmel, Ind., for three years from 1980-83 and assisted her husband as he served as president of the Indiana Indianapolis Mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Following that, they lived in Mesa for 10 years while Arden worked under President Ronald Reagan in the Agriculture Department.

They retired to Thatcher in 1985, where she resided until the time of her death. Mella was active in the LDS Church, serving in many capacities, including Ward and Stake Relief Society presidencies, Primary and Young Women. One of her most enjoyable callings was as ward organist and accompanist for the Singing Mothers. She also accompanied the Gila Valley production of Handel's *Messiah* for several years.

She was an active member of the Mt. Graham Hospital Auxiliary, Republican Women, and the Gila Harmonizers, and was a great support to her husband, Arden, in his many civic, professional, and church responsibilities. Of all her accomplishments, her greatest happiness came from caring for and loving her family.

Mella and Arden raised six children who also attended Eastern Arizona College - Jim (Celinda) Palmer, Mellani (Jeff) Larson, Shari (Jimmy) Elkins, Dave (Cyndi) Palmer, John (Shelley) Palmer, and Charlotte (Andy) Stewart.

The Mary Louise "Mella" Palmer Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a student in the EAC Nursing Program who demonstrates financial need while building skills to aid those in need of medical care.




