

# \$1.325 Million renovation will transform EAC Alumni Library

s part of its initiative to continually improve upon student success, the Graham County Community College District Governing Board awarded a \$1.325 million contract to TSG Constructors, LLC, to renovate the Eastern Arizona College Alumni Library.

"Even in this digital age, EAC's Alumni Library has been at the heart of our educational institution, but the way students use it has changed," stated Todd Haynie, EAC president. "This renovation will create a 21st-century learning environment with resources that better serve our students, faculty, and the community."

The renovation which started in February will combine the library and EAC's Student Learning Center, which is currently located in a different building. It will transform the space into a dynamic hub for multi-media, group collaboration, social interaction, advanced technology resources, tutoring, and individual study. The reimagined space will offer 27 individual and group study rooms, a lounge, a quiet zone with individual carrels, a reading nook, four quick-print stations, and a repurposed upper level for additional learning and tutoring space.

"The world is changing, and the way we access information continues to evolve," stated Kristen Becker, EAC director of library services. "Books still matter, but modern pedagogy requires libraries to evolve from collection-based to multi-media environments that appeal to students."

Library construction is expected to be completed during the summer of 2020. To accommodate construction, library services, such as access to books, periodicals, newspapers, and reference services, have been temporarily relocated to EAC's Academic Programs building. The Media Center will remain in its current location throughout construction, providing access to computers and course reserve materials.

### eac teaches remotely

# EAC teaches remoder of s

Then Aaron Burk stepped into Eastern Arizona College's science lecture hall last week, he faced a room of empty seats, and a screenful of students eager to learn.

At EAC, the COVID-19 pandemic has added new dimensions to Burk's role as professor of biology.

He and his fellow professors have shifted to remote instruction for the remainder of the spring semester due to the COVID-19 outbreak. Their students have been asked to stay at home.

"As an educational facility, we don't feel like we can put anybody's education on hold," said Burk.

"Instead of shutting down, we're trying to use this as an opportunity to ramp-up and provide even more for our students, even though it may be in a non-traditional format for us."

Based on recommendations from public health officials, EAC has required all instruction to move to remote learning.

"The majority of our faculty have already been using a learning platform for in-person classes called Canvas," he said. "We're familiar with that, and so are many of our students. Canvas streamlines digital tools and allows us to set up

discussion boards and live lectures." EAC has kept students, faculty, and staff well-informed throughout the COVID-19 outbreak with a web page dedicated to breaking news and information on how to get help with College services.

"Even though there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 on campus, it's so important for our students to not come back after spring break," said Todd Haynie, EAC president.

For classes requiring hands-on learning, EAC's instructors have been asked to move as much material online, and limit in-person meetings to 10 or fewer, using strictest social distancing practices.

"Obviously, there will be some disruptions," stated Haynie. "But if we work together, we can make this successful."

Other professors at EAC are using a wide variety of teaching tools to connect remotely with students. Instructors in the Math Department are using MyMathLab to deliver lectures, homework assignments, chapter tests, and Zoom remote conferencing to conduct virtual office hours. While video conferencing complicates large-scale choir rehearsals, music professors have replaced listening and memorization assignments

on Canvas, and compressed individual videos of students singing to create a virtual choir performance.

"I want to thank our faculty and staff," said Haynie. "The work they have done to make our classes remote and help curtail the spread of COVID-19 has been nothing short of remarkable."
